School Description and Mission Statement (School Year 2016-17)



Burney Junior-Senior High has a Comprehensive Safety and Response Plan which meets the state requirements described in California Education Code Sections 35294-35297. The plan was developed in cooperation with the Shasta County Sheriff's Department. The school has conducted school wide drills in order to better prepare in the event of an actual emergency. 

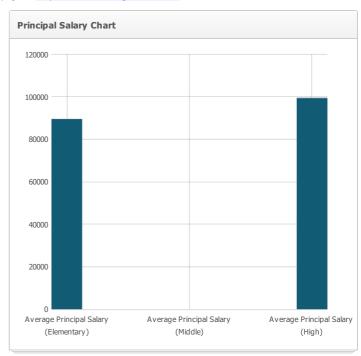
