Conclusions indicated by the data:

Students are advancing from a Beginning level on the CELDT in Kindergarten to either being re-designated or at a higher level on the CELDT in 6th grade. This is indicated by 14 EL students in Kindergarten and most of them at a Beginning or Early Intermediate CELDT level and only 3 EL students in 6th grade with 1 who is at Early Intermediate level.
